### Principal's Report – Jenny Blair

(laughter) So we are top of the district for elementary right now. Super excited about that, yeah. So hopefully we will stay that way. So we're wrapping up this year, we're already starting to schedule for next year, and look at placements and all the things that happen. But again, I appreciate all of you guys, and hopefully we'll all be sitting here again next year. It'll be here in the blink of an eye, so thank you.

## *Assistant Principal's Report – Champayne Ricciardi*

And my part is, I've been all about testing, and right now. K, one, and two, are doing their testing, so we'll have that data when we come back in the fall, and be able to share their, I'm sure, amazing data as well. That's pretty much been my whole world. So I don't have a whole lot else, but we've been crushing the testing and getting those kiddos done, we only have one third grader in three through five who still has a test to make up but other than that, we are...that's the only one in three through five, and that is amazing. We are farther along than, with makeups than I've ever been, so that's really good. It's just props to those kiddos coming to school at not staying at home for a long period time and like those. It makes my life so good, so easy. But that is it for me, testing my testing world is very happy right now.

## *Board Member Reports*

**Ressa:** Okay, so we'll move on to the board member reports.

## *Director of Finance – Ressa for Allison Hartsfield*

This will be the last time you're actually going to hear from me/Allison as the pretend director...I am the pretend Director of Finance, she's the real one. So just a few updates, things I want to point out from that we've spent and then brought in income-wise since the last time we met. 250 books spent for a birthday book club, which is a much needed and much appreciated expense. For Grandparents Day, we spent, you'll see it's about \$1,000 in there, which was the upfront cost for the "Lucky Grandparents" day t-shirts, which I believe we sold all of them, but two. One, all but one. So we were a little nervous, we bought those in the fall for that first book fair, so we were a little like, "Oh my God, that's a lot of money." Then Helene. So that's all great. And then we spent \$359 for the food and the coffee that we served the grandparents. And then as far as income, you move over to the green from those shirt sales and a little bit of the swag that we did, \$613.87. So it all evened out, we're all good there. So Grandparent's Day, from a financial perspective, was a great success. I want to point out the music enhancement and PE enhancement, those were \$500 each that we give. PE has spent just about all of theirs, and Mrs. Pursino is just shy of \$200 of hers. So hopefully she's going to hit us up with something else before the end of next week so she can use all of her allotment. And then for student support, we've had \$130 in field trip fees where we've provided field trip scholarships for students, and then we spent \$150 for STEAM Bowl t-shirts. That's with Mr. Piotrowski and the Gifted team. So that was for all of them to have matching KLES STEAM t-shirts at their competition. I do want to point out that for teacher allotments, we allocate \$9,000, and we have had a couple more that have come in this week, that doesn't reflect those. But we are only at \$6,400, so we have several more to provide for teachers

that haven't turned theirs in. So please, please spread the word, get those in by the last day of school. We have to have them submitted. If you do turn in your reimbursement request, I'm going to have Michelle Hodges email this out to all the teachers just to make sure they've got this form handy. Just include, like your mailing address. So that way, Allison can mail you a check over the summer. She won't delay. Like, she'll do it soon as soon as school ends, but just include your mailing address. But again, I'm gonna ask Michelle Hodges to send this out to all the teachers to make sure anyone who does have receipts or still have their \$200 that that gets spent before May 23rd. And that's all I have for the budget, so as always, email me any questions and I'll pass them along to Allison.

Alright, our Director of Communications, Kim, with the minutes, is she coming?

## *Director of Communications – Stephanie Santiago for Kim Colonna*

She hasn't texted, but I'll say what she'll probably say, which is make sure to sign in. Check the website for updates, and then follow on social media because those are her jobs there. When she comes, she'll want us to vote on minutes from last week also.

## *Volunteer Coordinator – Stephanie Santiago*

So first, Grandparent's Day. We had a few volunteers come and volunteered to take photos by the bench and the balloon arch that we had set up, check-in table and even table volunteers that Annemarie had run mainly there. So it was really helpful to have people there because we had such a large influx of grandparents in and out over those two days. We also had kindergarten orientation that same week on the 17th, and we had a few volunteers help out as tour guides and check in and pass out drinks and cookies and greeters and just familiar faces that those incoming kindergarten and kindergarten parents can now recognize. And we even had at the check in table, some people sign up to be helpful for PTO and volunteer. And so they have even been added to the remind group already for next year. And then this will kind of segue way to the other thing that I want to talk about. So Volunteer of the Month this month was Stephanie Diggs. Here is her other half, Mr. Troy, who just walked in. And your perfect timing, right on time, man, and her oldest, Abby. So we wanted to recognize Stephanie because she did such a great job spearheading Teacher Appreciation Week. She really took the lead on the planning committee that we had gathered for it. She communicated with all the room parents repeatedly during that time, distributed gifts for the staff, all those funds that we raised for staff. She handled all that and got it into their mailboxes and really did a lot of the behind the scenes planning for that. And also distributing the gifts for the teachers that don't have room parents, like our special areas and our ESEs and our paras and things like that. And with that, I also want to recognize the huge volunteer success that door decorations were. We decorated at least 56 doors on this campus, so that was a huge volunteer force that came out that Friday and got that done. And we hope it really shows our teachers how special they are to us and recognizing them for that. So thank you.

## *Old/New Business – Ressa Tomkiewicz*

Very good. Alright, we're gonna run through real quick, some old business, like, how we've been really busy and done a lot of activities this last, like, six weeks. So we talked about kindergarten orientation, how we broke into small groups and led tours for the first time ever. So that was really cool, kind of a new experience, new volunteer opportunity for us. Grandparent's Day and tied in with the Book fair, just to drop some numbers for you. There were 70 volunteer spots over a six-day period that were filled by 27 different individuals. So, you know, people picking up multiple shifts or coming a few days in a row. So that's just an incredible amount of parent volunteers coming out and making sure that book fair and Grandparent's Day was a success. We will be selling the "Lucky Grandparent" shirts again next year, they'll be in new colors, so they'll be kind of an all bright, multicolored, not just the green this year, and we will work to get those out in advance. So that way, we have plenty of time to order them through our

t-shirt vendor and have them delivered to you guys before Grandparent's Day. So that'll be a nice endeavor for next year. And then do we, this might be a question more for Mrs. Stemle, but do we have a fall and a spring book fair scheduled for next year, too? Does she have those dates yet?

**Jenny:** She has a plan. I don't think she has a date.

She doesn't have dates yet. Okay, but we'll have two, like last year? Okay, Perfect. And then for the mother-son event...so for the first time, we did our mother-son event at the FSU baseball game on May 4th. And just again, to throw some numbers at you, in a six-day period, we sold 130 tickets, and I believe they were \$4 dollars a ticket, so we sold way more tickets than we thought we were going to in that short window. So next year, we're going to have more tickets available because we do want to offer this opportunity up at that great ticket rate to as many families that can participate. It was a lot of fun out there. It was hot! So we're also going to look into an earlier season game, potentially, but it was still really fun. And the kids, the boys just had so much fun. You could see them all just like running down the stands and up the stands...it was a really cool showing of, you know, Killearn Lakes out there at the Dick Howser Stadium. So we'll definitely repeat it next year with more tickets. And then Teacher Appreciation Week, Stephanie did touch about the doors, which again, which is a phenomenal showing from our volunteers. And we were featured, the doors, and our school was featured, on Leon County's social media page, their Instagram, as well as WCTV news, by the way. So a nice little nod to our teachers and to our amazing school and...just our amazing parent community. And then I also want to give a shout out to Deer Lake Church that provided the desserts for Tuesday's dessert bar. A lot of those were like homemade by their church members and bought, so that was a really great showing on their part. And then some of you, some of the parents may not know, but we try, PTO tries to stalk the fridge in the teachers lounge with like, sodas and LaCroixs and waters all week long. And Canopy Roads Baptist Church actually supplies all of those drinks for us. So again, two really great community partners of ours that come through every year on Teacher Appreciation Week. And so we really value them a lot too. And so, yeah, that's in a whirlwind, what we've been doing the last six weeks. And we're going to move on to a new business.

So the most exciting thing that I'm ready to talk about today is going to be our board positions for next year. So a lot of lifting and shifting as some of us are transitioning out of roles and we've actually created a new board position role this year. So the very first thing I want to talk about is the role of president. So I am going to be transitioning out of the role of president. I've done it for three years in a row now, and I really am excited for, you know, someone to come in with new ideas and fresh perspective, and I'll still be on the board, but no longer serving as president, and Stephanie here is going to be transitioning in shadowing me through December next year to kind of learn the ins and outs and then we'll take on the role fully as of January. So I want to give a big clap to Stephanie. She's got a first grader here, and then an adorable old two-year-old that'll be here. So I know you're in it for the long haul and you've done an incredible job as volunteer coordinator, and so, it'll be a really, really great job for you next.

**Stephanie:** Thank you.

Our Director of Finance is no longer going to be Allison and...finally (laughter)...so we are going to have Kim Colonna, who was this year's Director of Communications, she's going to jump over to that role and fill those shoes. She has a fourth grader here, and then she has a kindergartner...or pre-k? Rising kindergartner. So again, she'll be here for the long haul as well. Co-directors of fundraising. So McKenzie, our wonderful McKenzie, will continue on as our fundraising director, and then I will be stepping into that co-director role with her. And so we really want to make sure there's continuity with the Shamrock Shuffle next year, as our biggest priority, to keep improving it and make sure it does become a tradition here at the school. So we'll be continuing to work on that project and then our other fundraising efforts. So that's where I'll be spending my time next year, as well as doing presidency transition work.

We are welcoming a new board member, Emily Catena, which some of y'all know. She has a first grader, Jameson, and then an adorable baby girl. She's going to be our new Director of Marketing. And so she's the one that handled all the Lunch Bunch SignUpGeniuses. If you saw her name floating around, she's wonderful and she's calm and kind and like, just really a wonderful woman to work with. So we're super excited to have her on board as our Director of Communications. And now for our new position, since communications does encompass so much now, we've decided to kind of break it up into two and form a Digital Marketing Coordinator, and that's going to be Danielle here, who's going to handle our website and then our Facebook and then an Instagram page, hopefully, in the future. So she'll be taking on that role and working closely with Emily to make sure that, you know, communications is working together as a whole, but we just do so much work on our website and we still need to do a lot of work and updating on our website. So to have someone designated to do that, I think will be really helpful as well as to continue to make sure that our social media presence is growing and good. And then Volunteer Coordinator, we are also welcoming somebody new. We have Annemarie here, who will be filling those shoes. She has a first grader and a fifth grader, and then this adorable baby girl. And so Annemarie has been on campus all year long behind the scenes, doing all these fabulous projects and so Stephanie was like, "Alright, come on, girl. Time to do some more stuff." (laughter) So she's going to be doing all her volunteer coordination...so SignUpGeniuses, volunteer recruitment, and whatnot next year.

**McKenzie:** And Annemarie does Birthday Book Club, too, for those who don't know, she is the one.

**Stephanie:** Taylor passed it on.

**McKenzie:** Yeah. So she'll be doing that.

And then our Business Partner Coordinator, I do have sad news to say that our lovely and wonderful Taylor is stepping down from this role for next year as she will be moving at some point over the summer, early fall. And so we're going to miss her, dearly. You've been here a decade?

**Taylor:** Yeah. Long time. A long time.

So she has really been such a wealth of knowledge. To me personally, you know, in making sure that we're doing things right and all of the institutional knowledge and traditions that we have, you know, pre-COVID and after COVID. So Taylor's going to be really greatly missed, and we're going to have some big shoes to fill for our Business Partner Coordinator. So that is the only vacant spot we have on the board. So we will be doing an all call over the summer for people that are interested in enjoying the board and becoming Business Partner Coordinator, that is a spot that we are going to be looking to fill. So that's kind of how the board's going to look for next year, but we still have lots of openings for chairs, committee chairs. So those are like the special projects throughout the year. Just off top of my head, Friendsgiving, Grandparents' Day, the mother-son event, and so many cool things happening next year with the 40th anniversary, so a lot of cool events and support there. And then also yearbook designer...somebody that can work with myself and Kim Colonna, to work on the yearbook for next year. So there will be more emails going out on ListServ over the summer, talking about committee chair openings, but I do know those are going to be available. So...that is the board next year, and our volunteer openings for next year. So, very good.

Alright, and then just graduation real quick, May 21, May 23, we've got a SignUpGenius for volunteers that's out, so that's kind of like our last big shindig for PTO events for the year. And then just want to touch on yearbooks real quick. So they are still available for sale on the PTO website for \$35. I just literally did a check, like accounted how many we have left in the office. We probably have about 80 left, which sounds like a lot, but honestly, last year, we sold 100 yearbooks just at graduation, between like the day before graduation and the day of graduation, we sold nearly 100. So we are expected we are going to sell out this year.

**Stephanie:** Can I just say something about graduation? So for the graduation sign up, one of the things I encourage, I know it's for fifth grade, but fifth grade parents are attending. And so we actually need people who don't have fifth graders to come and help with those other random

jobs that we have, whether it's standing and making sure the people in line know that they're supposed to stand in line, whether they have VIP seats or not, the doors are not open yet to people who stand and take pictures of the families as they walk through, things like that. So a lot of people are like, it's for fifth grade. It doesn't affect me, but then when it's your turn, you want somebody else to be doing those jobs for you, and that's kind of my take on it. So if you can't do it, that's okay, but I know there's a lot of home room parents in here. If you'll send that out, especially to those younger people, and kind of stress that little bit, because I feel like if I write that out, it kind of comes across a little rude, but I don't mean it rudely, I mean, like, you want to do it for someone else, because then somebody else could hopefully do it for you. So, because those parents are already tied up and they can't do it. But it is for them.

And so, yes, we do have some yearbooks to sell, but not many. They won't last long. Alright. So that's all I have from old business and new business for PTO news. So teachers, would you like to share any updates? Mrs. Reddick?
